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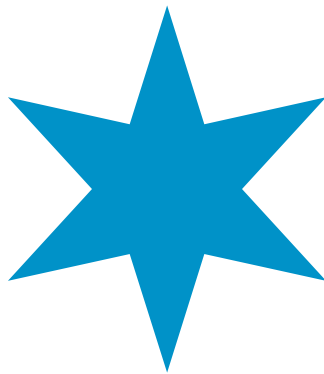
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AACAP Catchers in the Rye Awards

The American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry (AACAP) is honored to present its most prestigious awards, the AACAP Catchers in the Rye Awards, to our 2025 award recipients.



AACAP Catchers in the Rye Humanitarian Award

Bryan Stevenson, JD

The AACAP Catchers in the Rye Humanitarian Award is awarded by the AACAP Executive Committee. It was established in 1990 to honor those who have made a sustained and significant contribution to pediatric mental health through activities such as advocacy, education, entrepreneurship, philanthropy, research, and/or acts of bravery/kindness. AACAP is honored to present the 2025 Catchers in the Rye Humanitarian Award to Bryan Stevenson, JD.

Bryan Stevenson is a widely acclaimed public interest lawyer who has dedicated his career to helping the poor, the incarcerated, and the condemned. Mr. Stevenson is the founder and Executive Director of the Equal Justice Initiative, a human rights organization in Montgomery, Alabama. Under his leadership, EJI has won major legal challenges eliminating excessive and unfair sentencing, exonerating innocent death row prisoners, confronting abuse of the incarcerated and the mentally ill, and aiding children prosecuted as adults.

Mr. Stevenson has argued and won multiple cases at the United States Supreme Court, including a 2019 ruling protecting condemned prisoners who suffer from dementia and a landmark 2012 ruling that banned mandatory life-imprisonment-without-parole sentences for all children 17 or younger. Mr. Stevenson and his staff have won reversals, relief, or release from prison for over 140 wrongly condemned prisoners on death row and won relief for hundreds of others wrongly convicted or unfairly sentenced.

Mr. Stevenson has initiated major new anti-poverty and anti-discrimination efforts that challenge inequality in America. He led the creation of EJI's highly acclaimed Legacy Sites, including the Legacy Museum, the National Memorial for Peace and Justice, and Freedom Monument Sculpture Park. These new national landmark institutions chronicle the legacy of slavery, lynching, and racial segregation, and the connection to mass incarceration and contemporary issues of racial bias.

Mr. Stevenson's work has won him numerous awards including the prestigious MacArthur Foundation "Genius" Prize; the ABA Medal, the American Bar Association's highest honor; the National Medal of Liberty from the American Civil Liberties Union after he was nominated by United States Supreme Court Justice John Stevens; the Public Interest Lawyer of the Year by the National Association of Public Interest Lawyers; and the Olaf Palme Prize in Stockholm, Sweden for international human rights. In 2002, he received the Alabama State Bar Commissioners Award. In 2003, the SALT Human Rights Award was presented to Mr. Stevenson by the Society of American Law Teachers. In 2004, he received the Award for

Courageous Advocacy from the American College of Trial Lawyers and also the Lawyer for the People Award from the National Lawyers Guild. In 2006 New York University presented Mr. Stevenson with its Distinguished Teaching Award. Mr. Stevenson won the Gruber Foundation International Justice Prize and was awarded the NAACP William Robert Ming Advocacy Award, the National Legal Aid & Defender Association Lifetime Achievement Award, the Ford Foundation Visionaries Award and the Roosevelt Institute Franklin D. Roosevelt Freedom from Fear Award. In 2012, Mr. Stevenson received the American Psychiatric Association Human Rights Award, the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute Fred L. Shuttlesworth Award, and the Smithsonian Magazine American Ingenuity Award in Social Progress. Mr. Stevenson was inducted into the American Academy of Arts and Science in 2014 and won the Lannan Cultural Freedom Prize. In 2015, he was named to the Time 100 recognizing the world's most influential people. In 2016, he received the American Bar Association's Thurgood Marshall Award. He was named in Fortune's 2016 and 2017 World's Greatest Leaders list. He received the Martin Luther King Jr. Nonviolent Peace Prize, from the King Center in Atlanta in 2018. In 2020, he received the Right Livelihood Award from The Right Livelihood Foundation in Sweden. In 2023, he was awarded the National Humanities Medal by President Biden.

Mr. Stevenson has received over 50 honorary doctoral degrees, including degrees from Harvard, Yale, Princeton, the University of Pennsylvania, and Oxford University. He is the author of the critically acclaimed *New York Times* bestseller, *Just Mercy*, which was named by *Time Magazine* as one of the 10 Best Books of Nonfiction for 2014 and has been awarded several honors, including the American Library Association's Carnegie Medal for best nonfiction book of 2015 and a 2015 NAACP Image Award. *Just Mercy* was adapted as a major motion picture, and the film won the American Bar Association's 2020 Silver Gavel Award as well as four NAACP Image Awards. Mr. Stevenson is also the subject of the Emmy Award-winning HBO documentary *True Justice*. He is a graduate of the Harvard Law School and the Harvard School of Government.

AACAP is honored to present Saul Stepensky Tiktin, MD, Sergio Muñoz-Fernandez, MD, and Oscar Sánchez-Guerrero, MD, with the 2025 Assembly Catchers in the Rye Award to an Individual.

Around 1990, the Asociación Mexicana de Psiquiatría Infantil (AMPI) began taking part in the Assembly of Regional Organizations, with the right to speak but not to vote. In 1997, a working group of three delegates was created, given the strong interest in collaborating with AACAP. This group, integrated by Drs. Saul Stepensky, Sergio Muñoz, and Oscar Sánchez, has since participated in nearly every Annual Academy Meeting, helped organize some mid-year meetings (1994 and 2000), and served on the scientific committees of several joint AACAP meetings (San Antonio, San Diego).

Every two years, the president of the Academy is invited to attend AMPI's meeting. Almost all presidents have accepted this invitation, as have Ginger Anthony and Heidi Buttner Fordi, who have been the driving force within AACAP, offering constant and invaluable support to these efforts.

These collaborations have also allowed other distinguished child and adolescent psychiatrists to take part in the Mexican meetings. Their generous and voluntary contributions have strengthened bonds of friendship and professional cooperation with many colleagues and friends here today.

The AMPI delegates to the Assembly wish to express our deepest gratitude for the great honor we receive on this occasion. Please know that “the three amigos,” as we are fondly called among the many friends we have here, will continue working to strengthen the relationship between our association and AACAP.

The AACAP Assembly Catchers in the Rye Award to a Regional Organization was established in 1996 to recognize a regional organization for its outstanding advocacy efforts on behalf of children and adolescents. AACAP is honored to present the Washington State Council of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry with the 2025 Assembly Catchers in the Rye Award to a Regional Organization.

Our Washington State ROCAP is focused on advocacy efforts at the state and federal levels about a variety of issues, including expansion of quality evidence-based mental health care in Washington especially for underserved populations, opposition to granting psychologists prescribing privileges, promoting firearm safety, encouraging insurance payors to utilize a transparent and peer-reviewed tool for medical necessity criteria, and supporting mental health interventions in schools. Collaborating with the Washington State Psychiatric Association (WSPA) and Washington State Medical Association (WSMA) has expanded our advocacy impact. Several members of our group join respective advocacy days with WSMA in Olympia and with AACAP in “the other Washington,” DC. We regularly engage our local and national leaders by inviting them to speak at our regional conferences to discuss how to improve mental health services and provide continuing education opportunities. Our Washington State ROCAP also served as the Local Arrangements Committee for the AACAP Annual Meeting in Seattle in October 2024, where we enjoyed organizing events to showcase our corner of the country.

Our regional organization is humbled and honored to be selected for this award, which motivates us to identify additional ways to support underserved youth in our state and region. We thank the AACAP Council, and appreciate their example in promoting mental health initiatives nationally, and supporting state and federal legislation that promotes youth mental health.

AACAP Virginia Q. Anthony Outstanding Woman Leader Award

Patrice A. Harris, MD, MA

The AACAP Virginia Q. Anthony Outstanding Woman Leader Award is awarded by AACAP's President. It was established in 2013 to celebrate the lifetime achievements of extraordinary women in the field of child and adolescent psychiatry. As its namesake envisioned, the award is for women who have applied their talent, medical skills, and leadership to dramatically improve the wellbeing of children with mental illness. AACAP is honored to present the 2025 AACAP Virginia Q. Anthony Outstanding Woman Leader Award to Patrice A. Harris, MD, MA.

Patrice A. Harris, MD, MA, is the CEO and co-founder of eMed, a digital healthcare company founded to provide equitable access to diagnostic at-home testing.

Dr. Harris is a board-certified psychiatrist from Atlanta and has diverse experience as a private practicing physician, county public health director, and physician executive. She has deep experience and expertise in public policy and advocacy. Dr. Harris was the 174th president of the American Medical Association, the first African American woman and the first child and adolescent psychiatrist elected to that position.

Two themes that govern Dr. Harris's professional life are a passion to improve the lives of children and service to others. She has led efforts on both local and national levels to improve access to care for those with mental disorders.

Dr. Harris graduated medical school at West Virginia University and completed her psychiatry residency and fellowship training in child and adolescent psychiatry and forensic psychiatry at Emory University.

Dr. Harris is an adjunct assistant professor in the Emory Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences, and an adjunct clinical assistant professor in psychiatry and behavioral sciences at Morehouse College.

The AACAP Sidney Berman, MD, Award for the School-Based Study and Treatment of Learning Disorders and Mental Illness acknowledges outstanding leadership in the public education and treatment of learning disabilities. Albert Abramson, president of the Abramson Family Foundation, established this award in 1996 as a tribute to founding member and AACAP Past President (1969–71) Sidney Berman, MD.

Kristie Ladegard, MD, is an associate professor of psychiatry at the University of Colorado and a child and adolescent psychiatrist at Denver Health and Hospital Authority. She completed her medical degree at Creighton University followed by training in general psychiatry residency and child and adolescent psychiatry fellowship at East Carolina University. Dr. Ladegard has been instrumental in expanding school-based mental health services in Denver, helping to grow the program to 19 clinics, including 10 with on-site substance use treatment. She has received several awards for her service and innovation, including the 2010 Outstanding Mental Health Provider Award, the 2016 Deb Carter Distinguished Educator Award, and the 2024 Compassionate Care Award. A dedicated educator and author, she also co-edited the “School Consultation” chapter in the *6th edition of Lewis’s Child and Adolescent Psychiatry: A Comprehensive Textbook*.

I’m truly honored to receive this award from the Academy and deeply grateful to my colleagues and mentors—Shashank Joshi, Erika Ryst, Jeff Bostic, Sharon Hoover, and Shirley Alleyne—whose support and inspiration have been vital to this work. Being part of the school mental health community has given me a deeper passion for advocacy, innovation, and equity in youth mental health services. I want to thank the staff and students of Denver Public Schools for welcoming Denver Health and Hospital into their community.

Klingenstein Third Generation Foundation Award for Research in Depression or Suicide, supported by the Klingenstein Third Generation Foundation

Norbert Skokauskas, MD, PhD

The Klingenstein Third Generation Foundation Award for Research in Depression or Suicide recognizes the best paper published in the Journal of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry on depression and/or suicide, written by a child and adolescent psychiatrist, and published between July 2024 and June 2025. The award is supported by the Klingenstein Third Generation Foundation, which established this award in 1999.

Dr. Norbert Skokauskas, MD, PhD, is a professor of child and adolescent psychiatry at the Centre for Child and Adolescent Mental Health and Child Protection, IPH, Norwegian University of Science and Technology. He also serves as secretary for education and scientific publications at the World Psychiatric Association. Previously, he held a senior lecturer position in child and adolescent psychiatry at the Department of Psychiatry, Trinity College Dublin, Ireland, and worked as a consultant psychiatrist at Temple Street Children's University Hospital, Dublin, Ireland.

AACAP Irving Philips, MD, Award for Prevention

Heather J. Walter, MD, MPH

The Irving Philips, MD, Award for Prevention recognizes a child and adolescent psychiatrist and AACAP member who has made significant contributions in a lifetime career or single seminal work to the prevention of mental illness in children and adolescents. The award is named after former AACAP President Irving Philips, MD (1985–1987), who was renowned for his work in the field of prevention.

Heather Walter, MD, MPH, is a professor of psychiatry at Harvard University and a senior attending psychiatrist at Boston Children’s Hospital. Dr. Walter’s research and clinical interests focus on increasing access to preventive health and behavioral health (BH) services for youth in under-resourced communities. She has developed, evaluated, and nationally disseminated primary prevention programs addressing health risk factors and BH concerns in inner city schools; secondary and tertiary prevention programs targeting psychiatric disorders in schools and pediatric primary care; and digital BH education programs (*Building Bridges of Understanding*) for pediatric primary care practitioners, BH clinicians, and patients and families. Dr. Walter also served as co-chair of AACAP’s Committee on Quality Issues, which, during her tenure, published over 30 practice parameters, clinical updates, and clinical practice guidelines in *JAACAP*. Dr. Walter trained in preventive medicine, public health, and epidemiology at the University of California, Los Angeles; psychiatry at New York University; and child and adolescent psychiatry at Columbia University. Previously, Dr. Walter was the director of community school psychiatry at Columbia University; director of outpatient psychiatric services and professor of psychiatry at Northwestern University; and chief of child and adolescent psychiatry, vice-chair of psychiatry, and professor of psychiatry and pediatrics at Boston University.

My heartfelt thanks to AACAP and the Health Promotion and Prevention Committee for honoring me with this award. I would like to express my gratitude to the distinguished mentors who inspired my career and my teams of talented colleagues, without whom my work would not have been possible.

AACAP Norbert and Charlotte Rieger Award for Scientific Achievement

Kate D. Fitzgerald, MD, MS

The AACAP Norbert and Charlotte Rieger Award for Scientific Achievement recognizes the best paper published in the Journal of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry from July 2024 through June 2025. Established in 1988, the award is supported by the Norbert and Charlotte Rieger Foundation.

Kate D. Fitzgerald, MD, MS, is the Ruane Professor of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at Columbia University and New York State Psychiatric Institute (NYSPI). At Columbia University/NYSPI, she serves as director of research in the Children's Day Unit, and director of pediatric clinical studies in the Center for OCD and Related Disorders. She also co-leads NIMH-funded T32 and R25 training grants to cultivate the next generation of child and adolescent psychiatry researchers. Dr. Fitzgerald's clinical and research expertise is in pediatric obsessive compulsive and anxiety disorders. In her lab at Columbia University/NYSPI, she leads a team of interdisciplinary clinicians and researchers, combining fMRI, EEG and clinical trial methods to understand neural mechanisms of cognitive behavioral therapy effect, and to test brain-based interventions to improve outcomes in affected youth. Her research has implicated alterations of neural substrate for cognitive control in children, adolescents, and adults with OCD and anxiety disorders. Currently, she is conducting a randomized clinical trial testing a novel cognitive training game to enhance brain-behavioral capacity for cognitive control to augment exposure and response prevention therapy for children with OCD. Dr. Fitzgerald is also studying play-based cognitive training strategy designed to reduce early childhood anxiety by increasing EEG-indexed cognitive control. Dr. Fitzgerald is motivated to find ways to facilitate brain maturation to prevent and treat OCD and anxiety disorders in children and adolescents. She has published extensively on these topics in general and child psychiatric journals. She is grateful for the opportunity to work with early career researchers, especially post-doctoral fellow, Dr. Dana Diaz, a talented early career scientist who first-authored this 2025 Rieger Award paper in *JAACAP*.

The AACAP Norbert and Charlotte Rieger Service Program Award for Excellence recognizes innovative programs that address prevention, diagnosis, or treatment of mental illness in children and adolescents and serve as model programs to the community. Supported by the Norbert and Charlotte Rieger Foundation, the Award was established in 1996.

Wynne S. Morgan, MD, is an assistant professor of psychiatry and pediatrics at the University of Massachusetts. Dr. Morgan graduated from medical school at the University of Massachusetts where she also continued her training in adult and child and adolescent psychiatry. She is double board-certified in adult psychiatry and child and adolescent psychiatry.

Dr. Morgan’s work in child psychiatry has focused on building systems of care to promote childhood resilience factors that mitigate the impact of developmental trauma to support vulnerable children and families. She is co-program director of the FaCES Safe and Sound clinic at UMass Children’s Medical Center, an integrated behavioral health clinic for youth entering foster care. This clinic addresses both the medical and mental health needs of children as they enter the child welfare system, using a trauma-informed approach and emphasizing parenting supports with lived experiences. Dr. Morgan also serves as the consultant child and adolescent psychiatrist for the Massachusetts state child welfare system, the Department of Children and Families in Boston, MA, and helps lead psychotropic oversight efforts for youth in foster care throughout Massachusetts.

At AACAP, Dr. Morgan serves as a current co-chair of the Adoption and Foster Care Committee and a past committee liaison to the American Academy of Pediatrics’ Council on Foster Care, Adoption, and Kinship Care Executive Committee. Dr. Morgan also received the inaugural Marilyn Benoit Child Maltreatment Mentorship Award from AACAP in 2018.

AACAP Jeanne Spurlock, MD, Lecture and Award on Diversity and Culture

Eraka P.J. Bath, MD

The AACAP Jeanne Spurlock, MD, Lecture and Award on Diversity and Culture recognizes individuals who have made outstanding contributions to the recruitment of child and adolescent psychiatry from all cultures. This award was established in 2012 in honor of Jeanne Spurlock, MD, a giant in child and adolescent psychiatry and in advocacy for children, adolescents, and their families from all cultures. This award is administered through AACAP's Department of Research, Grants, and Workforce, along with AACAP's Diversity and Culture Committee, under the direction of Brandon Newsome, MD, and Deepika Shaligram, MD.

Eraka P.J. Bath, MD is professor and vice chair for justice, equity, diversity, and inclusion in the Department of Psychiatry, and assistant dean for faculty initiatives at the UCLA David Geffen School of Medicine. Board certified in child and adolescent, adult, and forensic psychiatry, she has committed her career to community mental health, advancing health equity for ethnoracially minoritized, and structurally marginalized youth and families, with specialized focus on youth impacted by the child welfare and juvenile legal systems. She teaches about structural racism, intersectionality, and antiracism, and how they shape mental health, biomedical research, and the healthcare workforce. Her research uses community-based models to improve behavioral and reproductive health engagement among girls with histories of commercial sexual exploitation and system involvement.

An AACAP member since 2005, Dr. Bath was recognized for her outstanding mentorship in 2018, and currently serves as *JAACAP* Assistant Editor of Health Equity and Antiracism. In addition to the Nominating Committee, she has also been a member of the Children and the Law Committee since 2009 and was appointed co-chair in 2017.

Dr. Bath obtained her undergraduate degree at University of California, Berkeley; her medical degree at Howard University; her general residency at Saint Vincent Hospital Manhattan; and her child psychiatry and forensic training at New York University, where she was faculty prior to joining UCLA.

The AACAP George Tarjan, MD, Award for Contributions in Developmental Disabilities recognizes a child and adolescent psychiatrist and AACAP member who has made significant contributions in a lifetime career or single seminal work to the understanding or care in the field of intellectual and developmental disabilities. The award was established in 1993 in honor of former AACAP President George Tarjan, MD (1977–79), by his wife, Mrs. George Tarjan, and friends.

Craig A. Erickson, MD, is a professor of psychiatry at Cincinnati Children’s Hospital Medical Center and the University of Cincinnati. Dr. Erickson leads a neurodevelopmental clinical and research group focused on improving clinical care through research discovery. He is the director of the Cincinnati Fragile X Research and Treatment Center, which is one of the largest such programs in the world. Additionally, he is the director of research in the Division of Psychiatry at Cincinnati Children’s Hospital.

I am honored to receive the George Tarjan award from AACAP. I devoted my career to improving outcomes for patients of all ages with developmental disorders following many summers prior to medical school spent working at camps for youth with autism and related disorders. My mentor Christopher J. McDougle got me off to great start in our field and since Cincinnati Children’s Hospital has offered tireless support of our work seeking to develop new and impactful treatments for the patients we serve.

AACAP Simon Wile, MD, Leadership in Consultation Award

Sandra L. Fritsch, MD, MEd

The AACAP Simon Wile, MD, Leadership in Consultation Award acknowledges outstanding leadership and continuous contributions in the field of consultation-liaison child and adolescent psychiatry. The award is named after Simon Wile, MD, a renowned pediatrician and lifelong supporter of child and adolescent psychiatry, and it was established in 2003 with a donation from the Massachusetts General Hospital.

Sandra L. Fritsch, MD, MEd, received her medical degree from Michigan State University in 1985. She trained in the first cohort of the Triple Board Program in pediatrics, psychiatry, and child psychiatry at Brown University and completed her residency in 1991. Her career has encompassed working at the interface of pediatrics and child psychiatry; both for inpatients in pediatric hospitals and in outpatient child psychiatry. Dr. Fritsch's current professional role is as the medical director of the Pediatric Mental Health Institute, Children's Hospital Colorado, executive director of the Colorado Mental Health Access Programs, and professor in the Department of Psychiatry at University of Colorado. While working in Massachusetts, Dr. Fritsch was fortunate to be involved in the Massachusetts Child Psychiatry Access Program (MCPAP), then developed a similar program in Maine and subsequently in Colorado. CoPPCAP, the Colorado Pediatric Consultation & Access Program, which Dr. Fritsch directs, is a HRSA PMHCA funded initiative. Dr. Fritsch's professional interests include collaborative care models between primary care and mental health providers, advocacy, innovations in medical education, and the interplay of physical health concerns and mental health needs.

André Luiz da Rosa, MD, MSc, PhD, is a clinician-researcher from Porto Alegre, Brazil, whose career bridges public health, clinical psychiatry, research, and education. He is completing his PhD at the Federal University of Rio Grande do Sul, where his work investigates the use of clozapine for treatment-resistant aggression in youth with autism.



Dr. da Rosa helped establish one of southern Brazil's first public, interdisciplinary programs for early neurodevelopmental assessments, dramatically expanding access to evidence-based care. He also leads regional initiatives through the Rio Grande do Sul Psychiatry Association and the Brazilian Association of Child Neurology and Psychiatry. His science communication project, *Infância com Evidência*, brings research-based knowledge to families, educators, and clinicians.

This award inspires me to continue building bridges between research, clinical care, and advocacy so that children and families everywhere, regardless of setting, can access evidence-based mental health support. I'm honored to bring the perspective of Brazil to AACAP's global community and deeply grateful for the opportunity to learn, share, and contribute.

AACAP Ülkü Ülgür, MD, International Scholar Award

AACAP's Ülkü Ülgür, MD, International Scholar Award recognizes an AACAP member in the international community who has made significant contributions to the enhancement of mental health services for children and adolescents. The award was established in 2013 with a donation from AACAP member Ülkü Ülgür, MD.

Prof. Dr. Nazish Imran is Professor and Head of Child and Family Psychiatry at King Edward Medical University, Lahore, Pakistan. She established Pakistan's first public-sector inpatient unit for children in 2012, co-founded a free multidisciplinary Autism and Neurodevelopmental Therapy Centre, and co-developed the country's first national suicide prevention guidelines for youth.

She also spearheaded Pakistan's first fellowship in child and adolescent psychiatry, mentoring the next generation of specialists, and contributes internationally through the IACAPAP e-Textbook, AACAP, and WPA.

Through clinical innovation, advocacy, and training, Dr. Imran has expanded access to evidence-based care in low-resource settings and continues to advance child and adolescent mental health in Pakistan and beyond.



This recognition reflects not only my journey but also the resilience and commitment of all those working for children's mental health in Pakistan. It inspires me to continue building sustainable services, mentoring the next generation, and ensuring that every child has the chance to thrive.

AACAP's Psychodynamic Faculty Initiative Mentorship Award

AACAP's Psychodynamic Faculty Initiative (PsyFI) Mentorship Award aims to support and advance psychodynamic psychotherapy training in child and adolescent psychiatry residency programs through faculty development. This award provides an opportunity for recipients and mentors to design a project over 12–16 weeks focusing on child welfare, foster care, and/or child maltreatment in order to raise awareness, recognize leaders, and create a community of knowledgeable teachers who will become leaders in these fields.

Obaro “Tobi” Okopie, MD, MPH, is a second-year triple board resident in the Boston Combined Residency Program—Boston Children’s/Boston Medical Center & Tufts Medical Center. She completed her undergraduate degrees in biochemistry, minor in justice and peace studies at Georgetown University. She then matriculated into a dual degree, MD/MPH program, between Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center El Paso & University of Texas Health at Houston. There, Dr. Okopie had the opportunity to explore the realities of border health and the implications for child well-being and development. After graduating in 2024, she began residency with the Boston Triple Board Program, with the ambitious goal of pursuing preventive psychiatry through an integrated primary care model for unhoused, migrant, justice-involved and system-involved youth.

Dr. Okopie’s project, “Where the Kids Go: Care Utilization Patterns Among Children with a History of Trauma,” intends to explore the differences in care utilization between children with and without a history of abuse. Her mentor, Dr. Mary Margaret Gleason, serves as the chief of early childhood at Boston Children’s Hospital. This project is meant to gain a better understanding of Child Protective Services (CPS) involvement and its potential implications.

Amanda E. Downey, MD

The AACAP Drs. Gabrielle and Harold Carlson Psychopharmacology Research Award was established in 2022 to provide mentored research funding support to a child and adolescent psychiatry second-year fellow or early career faculty in the area of psychopharmacology, to include neurotherapeutics, with a focus on practical and investigative work toward treatment for children and adolescents. Offering \$20,000 to one child and adolescent psychiatry fellow or early career faculty to complete a two-year mentored research project, this award supports early investigators at a critical stage, encouraging a future career in child and adolescent psychiatry research.

Amanda E. Downey, MD, is an associate professor of pediatrics and psychiatry at the University of California, San Francisco (UCSF). She partners closely with patients and families to develop treatment plans that honor their strengths and challenges, and she aims—through education, advocacy, and research—to dismantle the systems that increase risk for eating disorders. Dr. Downey serves as the assistant medical director of the UCSF Eating Disorders Program. She earned her medical degree at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai and completed a triple board residency at the University of Pittsburgh.

Dr. Downey’s research program explores innovative psychopharmacologic treatments for youth with severe eating disorders, including ketamine and psilocybin therapy, alongside nutritional rehabilitation strategies that impact metabolism and cognitive function. With support from the AACAP Drs. Gabrielle and Harold Carlson Psychopharmacology Research Award, Dr. Downey is examining the mechanisms by which psilocybin-assisted psychotherapy might alleviate rigid thought patterns and affective dysregulation in anorexia nervosa, including inflammation. Her project builds on her dual training in pediatrics and psychiatry and her commitment to evidence-based, compassionate treatment. The work supported by this award laid the groundwork for subsequent grants that have significantly expanded the scope and impact of her research.

I am deeply honored to receive the AACAP Drs. Gabrielle and Harold Carlson Psychopharmacology Research Award. This award has allowed me to explore novel therapeutic pathways for young people with eating disorders and to bridge the worlds of medicine and psychiatry. 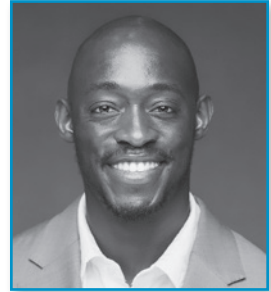

Beginning in 2009, this program is intended to facilitate basic or clinical research relevant to our understanding, treatment, and prevention of child and adolescent mental health disorders.*

Jessica E. Becker, MD, MPH, is a child and adolescent psychiatrist focused on the intersection of physical and mental health conditions in youth, and a decision science researcher. She is currently the associate chief of Intensive Psychiatry Services in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at the Franciscan Children's site of Boston Children's Hospital, as well as a member of faculty in the Department of Psychiatry at Harvard University. She graduated with an AB from Harvard College and an MD from Yale University. She completed her clinical training in the combined Adult-Child and Adolescent Psychiatry program at Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH)/McLean Hospital and stayed on at MGH as faculty on the pediatric-consultation liaison psychiatry service while completing the Harvard-wide Pediatric Health Services Research Fellowship and a Master in Public Health degree at Harvard University.



Dr. Becker's research focuses on the implementation and evaluation of policies impacting the delivery of care, using the tools of mathematical simulation modeling, cost-effectiveness, and health services methods. Her Junior Investigator Award project focused on the development of a novel simulation model of pediatric depression, which can be used to examine the population-level impact of a variety of mental health interventions for children. She has utilized this new model to assess the clinical benefits and cost-effectiveness of the collaborative care model for depression treatment in pediatric primary care. Her work has been recognized with several awards including most recently the Early Career Researcher Mentee Award from the Academy of Consultation-Liaison Psychiatry.
